Referencing

Bibliographical references in the text

In the BBSR publications, the American referencing rules are used.

Bibliographical and internet references are formulated in shortened form and brackets directly in the text including names of authors/editors, year of publication and page reference. When referring to another publication, a "cf." is prefixed within the bracket

The complete source details are given in a bibliography (see referencing rules below). For laws,

regulations and directives, separate forms of referencing are used.

Bibliography: referencing rules

The sources used in the bibliography are listed in completely referencing alphabetically according to authors or editors, several articles of an author having to be sorted in ascending order of year of publication. Single sections are structured by full stops. Each source closes with a full stop.

English abbreviations like "ed.", "vol.", "p./pp." are replaced by the German abbreviations "Hrsg.", "Bd." or "H." and "S.".

Sources of law are listed in a separate bibliography.
